Opposition and dissent toward processes – not toward wolves

- Administrative, litigative and discursive inertia in the system
- Monitoring and reporting perceived to "punish itself" for some member states.
- →Impetus for going outside of the system through:
- Illegal hunting "shoot, shovel and shut up"
- Non-reporting e.g. refusal to report game inventory to local public authority
- Rumor spreading narratives of large carnivores as secretly released or hybrids
- Dissent & protest boycotts, bonfires, noncooperation, road blockages



Commoning & Fragmenting of Wildlife

- Strong perceptions of 'green' appropriation by the EU
- Ravens = "EU crows" (deragory), wolves = "their little pets", "I keep my animals fenced in, you do the same with yours"
- Possessiveness toward 'our own' stocks: "our moose", "my pheasants"
- Private ownership of wildlife and natural resources is a short-term solution.
- Partitioning makes things worse toward 'commoning'?
